I first discovered the team on facebook in November of 2011, during a general search of Sunderland AFC. I became friends and after numerous conversations with Team manager Paul Kimani, I came to realise how he and the team were struggling to survive.

The team was started in 2007, when a few friends got together to come up with an idea to help the youngsters in the area, to help prevent them falling into crime, and vices, after many of the kids were either dying through poverty, or ending up in jail, by stealing, simply so their families had food on the table.

The football project started in their home village of Karai, in the Rift Valley Provence of Kenya, and over time the kids and locals had formed a team and even a kid's football academy, but without any funding at all, Manager Paul, Theuri (now team captain) and other friends were themselves going without meals, to keep the project running.

The name Sunderland AFC Keroche came about, through the number of African players who have played for our club over the last few years IE. Muntari, Mensah, Gyan, ETC and the Keroche part was added as many people in the area refer to their village of Karai, as Keroche, as the large Keroche brewery in their village.

There have been numerous times when Paul and his friends wanted to give up, and wondered if it was all worthwhile, but through hard work, dedication and numerous hurdles they persevered. In February of this year they finished 8th in the local district league, just missing out on promotion to the provincial league by a few points, and when you consider the conditions and pitfalls they faced throughout the season you'll realise what a fantastic achievement this is. Please see this list;

- 1, Without any funding the team had walk to every game, and with some away games up to 10miles away, they walk there, play the game, and walk 10 miles back to the village
- 2, Team members can be trying to earn some kind of a living by hawking water on Donkey carts, at the local market, or working in the local quarries up until 15mins before a game.
- 3, Most of the children come along to the academy and play football in their bare feet.

This is just a small example of some of the hardship they endure, but even with all of this, they carry on with smiles on their faces.

So in November last year I put out an appeal, through social networking sites, The Sunderland Echo & Sun FM to ask anyone and everyone to donate any old kit they had lying around, and immediately contacted my friend Michael Ganley to see if he could help, and as always he came up trumps

Between us, the response has been way beyond our wildest expectations, so much so that on Friday, Feb 24th, 17 full boxes of kit were collected by TNT to be shipped over to the team. In these boxes are over 600 Sunderland shirts, more than 100 pairs of football boots (all sizes), a set of goal nets, a first aid box, Over 100 pairs of shorts & socks, all the required goalkeepers equipment, IN FACT ANYTHING YOU COULD POSSIBLY NEED TO RUN A SUCCESSFUL FOOTBALL ORGANISATION, even down to little things like captains armbands, hats, scarfs, spare laces and studs. All collected in the collection boxes which local pubs and companies put in their premises.

As Michael and I realised how successful the appeal for kit was going, we turned our attention to the most important part, "trying to raise sponsorship & funding" to secure the long term future of the team and the academy, and within weeks we have managed to raise over £2,500, which will keep the whole organisation going for almost 2 years, but Michael and I are making this an on-going project to keep raising funds for the team.

So far every member of the 1st team squad has been sponsored to the tune of £50 each by local businesses and individuals. With the first team now having their main sponsors as TOMBOLA just like our own team.

Their own local KEROCHE BREWERIES have just become Main Academy sponsors, and gave team members the news that any future vacancies at the brewery, will be offered to team players who are currently unemployed. Individual sponsorship of the academy players is still available.


